# Written after a committee discussion on problems re: - **HEAVY WEATHER**

and the Race Management Team - RMT

The recent heavy days caused problems for both competitors and safety boat crews. We all want boats to be able to enjoy sailing in exciting weather conditions but in reasonable safety so please read on........

<u>Personally</u> we all have limits as to when it is wise for us to sail, and it takes experience to make the correct judgement. The RMT will always be happy to give impartial advice, about the difficulties likely to be found afloat, as they will have already been out there!

The <u>Safety Boat</u> is there for all competitors and MUST be aware of the whole situation, constantly reassessing it and being prepared to immediately leave one boat if another is in greater need. Crews that are safe but stranded must always be left until all riskier situations are dealt with.

<u>Clothing</u> – Recommendations are made by your committee – but what you wear is your decision made in view of the weather, your boat, experience and age. The RMT however has to assume that all sailors are dressed correctly - underneath - for the conditions!

Boats need to be checked most carefully and loose equipment secured in the boat or left ashore. Your signature on the entry form says your buoyancy is OK. Unfortunately painters are often short and weak ....BUT

Painters are essential - if you need help, either with righting or towing. In rough weather when boats capsize there is not time to jury rig painters. So for winter sailing we are asking every boat to have a 3-4m painter of 6 mm preferably floating rope - permanently attached and easily reached by the Safety Boat Crew. To make this as easy as possible the club has ordered a reel of 6mm Marstron floating rope and will have 4m painters available for club members to purchase if they wish. The cost to buy at a Chandlery £2.88 from the club a bargain at £2.00!

Boats without suitable painters, when needed, are a definite safety hazard as they take so much longer to rescue while putting others at risk. In heavy weather when righting and towing are time consuming, crews will have to be taken ashore and their boats retrieved later.

Because a Safety Boat with Passengers ceases to be a Safety Boat and becomes a Ferry! we will try to avoid this whenever it is safe to do so.

This decision will rest entirely with the RMT

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#### SAFETY - BUOYANCY AIDS

There is a rack of buoyancy aids in the clubhouse donated by members of RBSC for general use. If you use them please make sure that they are properly sized and correctly fitted. Parents are responsible for their children and the choice of equipment they use. The buoyancy aids are inspected regularly and any damaged ones discarded. If you find any that are damaged, please put them to one side and inform me or any member of the Committee.

Whilst these buoyancy aids are available, the Club cannot be expected to be held responsible for how they are used. Therefore we **use them at our own risk**.

A note on children's buoyancy aids with collars: they are for the use of those up to approximately 7 years of age. The reason for the collar is that younger children tend to be heavier in the head and shoulder area. The collar adds buoyancy reducing the possibility of the child floating upside down. Otherwise buoyancy aids with collars should not be used due to the risk of getting tangled up with the rigging of your dinghy.

Any further donations of buoyancy aids in good condition would be much appreciated. Any questions or comments on buoyancy aids or safety in general please feel free to contact me.
